POSTLUDE

TODAY'S SCRIPTURES: Fourth Sunday in Lent, Year A

In one of the first instances of healing or miracle in this Gospel, John presents a story with layers of meaning, contrasting the blindness of those who could see with with the insight and vision of one born blind....

The action began with Jesus and his disciples encountering a blind man begging along the road. Apparently the disciples already knew him and his condition, since they commented that he had been blind from birth. What they didn't know, however, was who had sinned. Working from their worldview that illness and disability were the results of sin, they looked for a non-physical reason for the man's blindness. Jesus used their question to confront the inaccuracy of this notion, offer an opportunity to see the greatness of God, and confront the religious authorities with their own shortsightedness. . . .

The man was not consulted about his wishes. Jesus simply initiated the first step in the restoration process. He made mud to smear like ointment on the man's eyes and told him to take the second step—to wash in the pool of Siloam. Then able to see, the man returned center stage, and Jesus became a secondary character. First the neighbors and acquaintances, then the Pharisees and villagers, began questioning and speculating about what had happened. . . . The religious authorities squabbled and sputtered about the healing, which had been done on the sabbath. . . . They did not want to hear that someone who challenged their authority and broken sabbath law was a prophet. . . . and possessed a clearer vision of religious propriety than they. . . .

PCUSA MISSION HIGHLIGHT AND PRAYER

From fighting against wage theft to pushing for more affordable housing, the Koreatown Immigrant Workers Alliance has made its mark by challenging injustice in their southern California enclave since 1992. The alliance, also known as <u>KIWA</u>, is on the frontlines, bringing about change for low-wage workers and other vulnerable community members in the Los Angeles area. KIWA's advocacy work has led to better pay and working conditions at markets and restaurants in Koreatown and elsewhere in Los Angeles.

The nonprofit also co-developed a 52-unit affordable housing complex, Casa Yonde, in Koreatown in 2014, and continues to provide supportive services for tenants, who include formerly homeless individuals and families. Some former foster youths, people with mental health issues and survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault, also may reside there.KIWA's advocacy work has led to better pay and working conditions at markets and restaurants in Koreatown and elsewhere in Los Angeles.
